AEJMC TEACHING STATEMENTS WORKSHOP

What should you do in a teaching statement?

Showcase your approach to teaching (how you foster student learning) and your teaching experience Focus on your role (teacher) in the learning process, how learning occurs in your classes/other experiences, and your goals for students

Step 1: Courses taught/TAd/guest speaker

Semester & year	Course number & name	# of students	Course type (undergrad/grad; major/nonmajor; in person/online)	 Showcase activity or assignment (met learning goal)

Step 2: Other relevant instructional experience

Examples: Leading a workshop, community teaching

Step 3: Teaching recognition

Examples: Awards, grants, emails

Date	Title/type of recognition	Source of recognition	Summary of recognition	Have in your possession?

Step 4: Theories of teaching

How are you applying teaching theories (perhaps without even realizing it)?

Search committees now seek candidates who are qualified to teach and design courses effectively across multiple modalities (face-to-face, online, and/or hybrid). Look for ways to connect your teaching practices with theories of teaching and demonstrate pedagogical strategies.

Getting started: Look at learning goals and activities/assignments from Steps 1 & 2 and identify how they align with education theories

Do these...

Engage with education theory on teaching & learning

Cite 1-2 theorists who inform your course design & pedagogical approach

Know differences between online education & remote emergency teaching

Address differences in approach for teaching skills courses v. critical analysis

Not these...

Rely on "I taught online in the pandemic" as online teaching experience

Instead: focus on professional development, like online teaching certification

Approach online pedagogy the same as classroom-based pedagogy

Overlook the importance of feedback in teaching

Write two declarative statements

<u>Sentence 1</u>: Describe your most important pedagogical philosophy in a face-to-face course.


<u>Sentence 2</u>: Describe your most important pedagogical philosophy in an asynchronous online course.

Bonus points: If you can integrate education theory, great, but it's not required for this rough draft.


Step 5: Finding connections

How do they like to learn?


When are they most engaged in your classes?

Step 7: Drafting your teaching statement

Go back to the groups you identified in Step 5



Explain one way learning occurs in one of the groups and your role in facilitating that learning Add a relevant example of how you help students in that group learn via a teaching theory

- If you've received recognition for successful teaching re: this group, include it
- If learning occurs in other ways in this group, explain it and your role in facilitating learning. Then add a relevant example of how you help students learn
